Stumpage values for young growth Douglas fir will average \$127 per thousand, 27 percent higher than this year; hemlock \$120/MBF up 48 percent, and red cedar \$111/MBF, 18 per cent more than in 1974.


Young growth accounted for 29.1

percent of the Western Washington harvest on privately-owned timber lands in 1973. Thinnings of Douglas fir in Western Washington will average \$89/MBF, up 17 percent, and hemlock, \$79/ MBF, up 27 percent. Thinnings accounted for 3.6 percent of the 1973 statewide harvest.
