What can we trust?

During the last two weeks, there has been an increasing number of rumors, accusations and complaints coming to our office concerning the Forks school system. After trying to get to the bottom of the rumors by checking

with authorities, and asking questions to clarify the accusations, and trying to learn whether complaints are justified, frankly, we know little more about Forks' school situation than we did

But upon deep consideration of the entire matter, taking an outside view of it all, it seems the base line comes down to this: Lack of trust between the community and the school administra-

How did this situation develop? Why are large numbers-in the hundreds--of ordinary citizens in Forks ready, willing and able to believe almost any wild rumor about the school? Is it because rumors and gossip are the only information available to us? We've recently learned that copies of board minutes should

have been mailed to the paper. They have not been, but will in the future at our request. We can't notify you of the board's agendas because they always seem to arrive at the wrong time to get into print. You see, if we learn of Tuesday meeting on Monday night, and the paper comes out on Thursday, we can't alert you to what is going on. Yet this action is within

required by law. As Oliver Wendall Holmes once quoted, "It isn't the letter of the law, but the spirit of the law...."and in our opinion this is truly one of those cases in which the letter of the law is being carried out, but the spirit of the law--to inform the people who are paying for this system and whose children are subject to it--is being abused.

A law of nature says that a vacuum cannot exist--something will rush in to fill any void. So it is with knowledge. In the absence of real concrete information about Forks' school workings--rumors, accusations
