LAND-LAWS.

How Foreign-Rorn Persons may Acquire Title to Public Lands.

Persons of foreign birth or parentage who have not been naturalized, nor declared their intentions to become citizens of the United States, nor received honorable discharges from the military or naval service of the government, may purchase lands at private entry within the same as foreign born men, the proceeding mile in thickness. We are of the opinion, however, that it is very doubtful whether the right to purchase land at private entry in the Territories--if any can be found subject! to such entry—has been denied to foreigners by said act.



Do not force young pear trees too raplidly, as it has been demonstrated that the blight dees not as readily attack trees that grow slowly as it does those that grow quickly. A grass crop will soon ruin a peach orchard.


